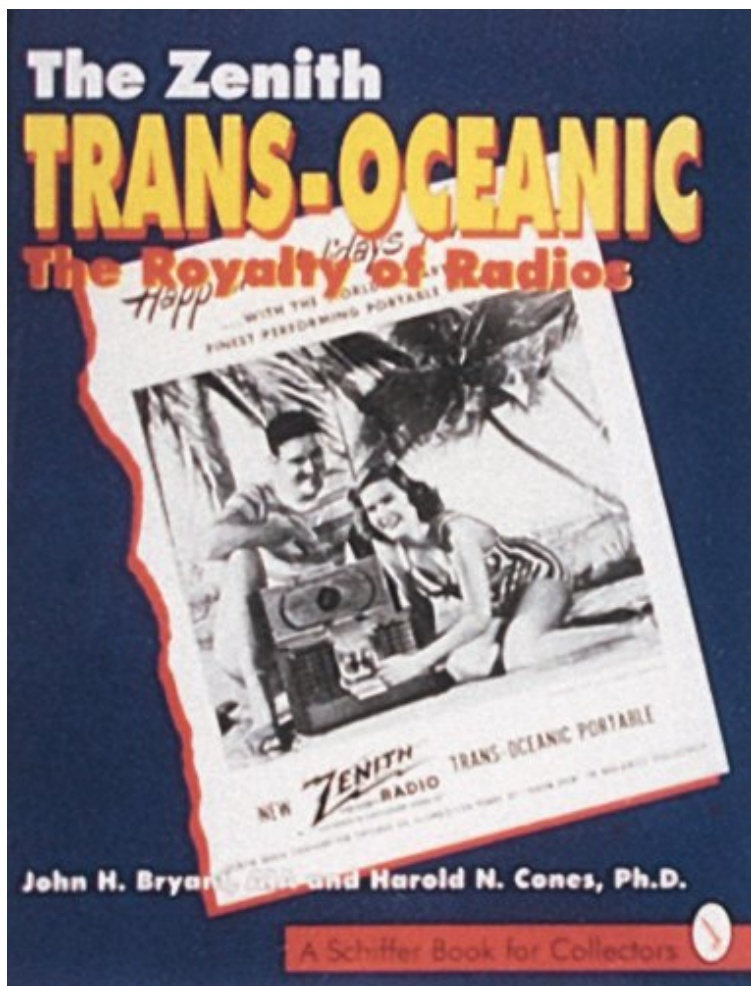

I had a Japanese pocket transistor radio . Well I also had big fancy tube type shortwave radios at home. What impressed me about the Transoceanic was it would receive many of the same SW stations on its

built in antenna as my fancy radios on outdoor antennas. So much for the radio. I bought this book because there are so many models of this radio out there I wanted to find the one just right for me. We all have different things we like and this book will help you decide which radio to buy unless you want one of each. I'm not going to collect these, but I wanted the one that would best fit my listening habits.
